The Seven Principles Of Human Nature

The mystery of our human nature remains as the supreme question of attaining self-knowledge. This same question remains as the holy grail of philosophy, science, religion and art. Without beating around any argumentative complications, here is a direct answer that we offer for deeper study or for further investigation.

For starters, we are of a sevenfold nature. It is sevenfold, because the nature of our humanity is, in reality, a unity. However, this unity is like a sheet of paper folded into seven parts, which is what we refer to here as the seven principles of our human nature. As we grow and unfold, the 7-principles are, in truth, a unity, the Oneness or cosmic wholeness experienced in unconditioned states of meditation or realization.

The unity of our humanity manifesting as the seven principles of our human nature is the master key to unlocking the mystery language or spiritual metaphors of the myths, legends and fables found in the ancestral writings and scriptures of the world religions.

Most of us have also experienced a dualistic nature. We feel we have the good and the bad within that at times battle each other. The "good" is our Spirituality. The "bad" is our Personality. (See Chart A. The Seven Principles ...)

Our dual nature as Spirituality and Personality can be understood further under other familiar names, such as: the higher self and lower self, the immortal self and mortal self, the soul and body, the spiritual self and material self, the unselfish self or selfless self and the selfish self or ego; the promised land and the land of bondage, the Sea of Galilee and Dead Sea, King Solomon and his Temple, Carpentry and Masonry, sword and scabbard, the beauty and the beast, the heavenly and the earthly, the wine and the cup, wisdom and folly, hero and villain; the light and darkness, dharma and karma, paradise and inferno, the tree of life and the tree of good-and-evil, the angel and the devil in us, and many other missed metaphors. But all are resolved by the unity or final union as the divine marriage.


